The Welsh Government has set challenging targets to increase the number of adult learners in the country as a way of building skills and improving employability.

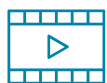
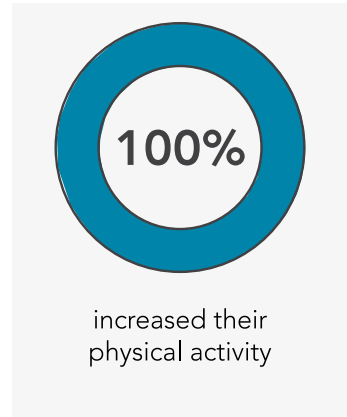
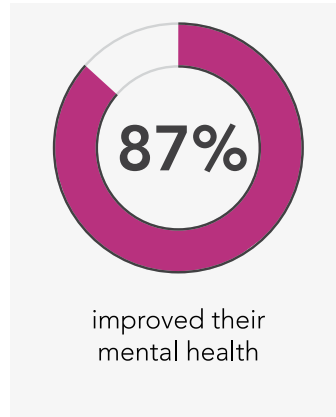
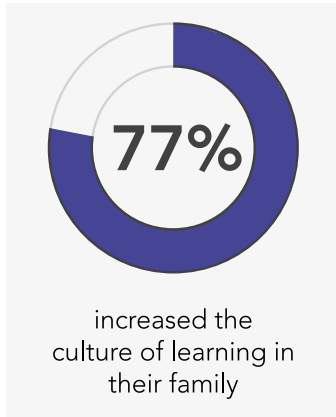
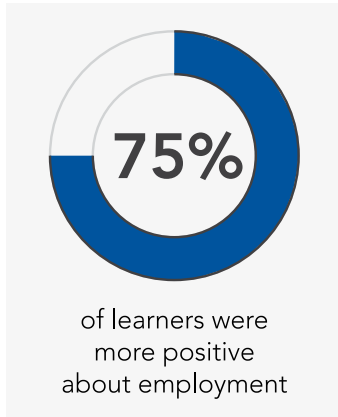
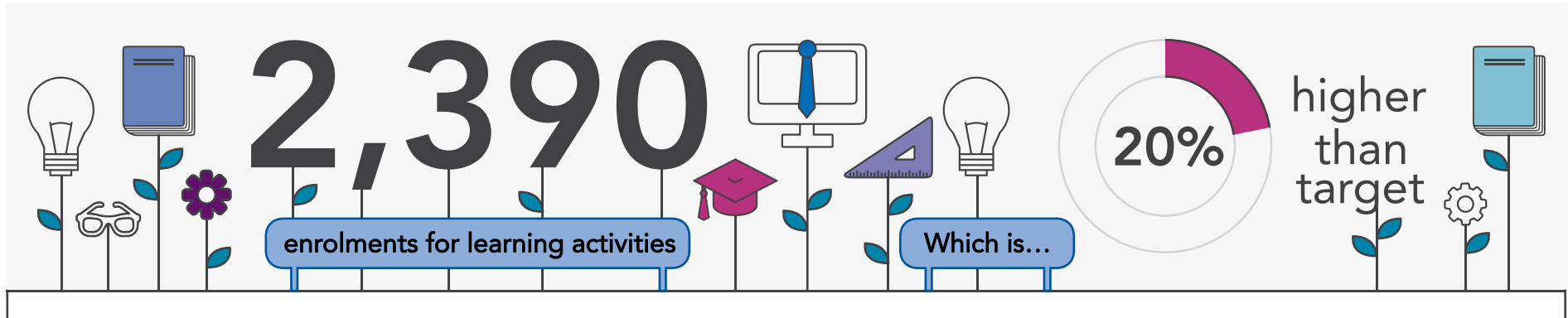
NIACE Cymru worked with Communities First clusters to get more adults involved in learning – and exceeded the target by 20 per cent.

Working with 36 clusters of volunteer and learning provider groups, we staged outreach and learning tasters to get more adults involved and build on existing skills and experience.

And we trained staff within the clusters so they could engage hard-to-reach adults. We also provided the tools to measure the quality and impact of the training. Our analysis showed that ‘soft’ learning had big impacts on learners’ lives.
